PURPOSE

The purpose of a Community Needs Assessment is to identify and prioritize the needs and resources of a defined community or communities. Data is gathered from target populations and results are analyzed in order to understand the causes and conditions of poverty and changing population demographics. The agency's board and leadership use this data to design effective, outcome based programs that will alleviate poverty. The analyzed data is summarized in a report which can be used to provide justification, both to funders and the public, on the need for resources and how resources are being allocated to programs. The report also provides useful data to educate the public and community leaders about issues related to poverty.



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OVERVIEW

Agency Overview

INCA Community Services, Inc. is a private, non-profit corporation organized for the purpose of executing, coordinating, and planning programs authorized by federal, state, and local entities to alleviate and attempt to eradicate poverty in the Atoka, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray Counties in Oklahoma.

INCA Community Services, Inc. is a Community Action agency established to address the local causes and conditions of poverty by providing programs and services that promote self-sufficiency and help improve the quality of life and economic stability for individuals and families residing in Atoka, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray Counties in southern Oklahoma. Several of INCA's programs have extended their reach beyond the four county service areas. INCA's programs include Head Start/Early Head Start, Public Transportation, Housing and Weatherization, Developmental Disability support, Emergency Services, Homeless support, VITA tax preparation, health insurance and prescription assistance, food and clothing banks, holiday projects, and other short term services. Since 1965, INCA has been committed to the needs of the community and providing tools to disrupt the cycle of poverty for countless individuals and families.

In 1965 most Southeastern Oklahoma Counties started their "War on Poverty" individually. Then in in 1969, ten counties were consolidated into a single entity: Indian Nation Community Action Foundation, Inc. which consisted of Atoka, Bryan, Carter, Coal, Garvin, Johnston, Love, Marshall, Murray, and Pontotoc Counties. The Indian Nation Community Action Agency's ten counties had a population of approximately 165,000 people and covered approximately 7,000 square miles, the largest in the state of Oklahoma. The enormous size created many problems, such as coordination efforts and attempting to generate community support that is so vital to its success. So on January 31, 1972, Bryan, Carter, Coal, Love, and Pontotoc Counties were incorporated into a separate Community Action Agency, with covered Atoka, Garvin, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray Counties still being served by Indian Nations Community Action agency. In 1974, the Indian Nations Community Action was retitled to be INCA Community Services, Inc. due to public confusion about whether the program was for tribal members only. In 1979 Garvin County withdrew and became an independent county. Today INCA's Community Service area is: Atoka, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray

INCA also provides services in the following counties: Carter, Coal, Bryan, Choctaw, Garvin, Pittsburg, Pontotoc, and Pushmataha. The core funding of INCA Community Services has been received from the Office of Economic Opportunities (1964-1974), Community Services Administration (1974-1981), and the Community Services Block Grant (1981 to present).

A twelve (12) member Board of Directors governs INCA Community Services. The Board is composed of four (4) members from the low-income sector, four (4) members from the private sector, and four (4) members from the public sector.

Agency Mission

INCA Community Services, Inc. shall operate programs to alleviate the causes of poverty and enhance the public health and welfare by opening to everyone the opportunity to work, have safe and affordable housing, transportation, training and education, and live in decency and dignity.

Community/Service Area

INCA Community Services CSBG community is Atoka, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray Counties in Southeastern Oklahoma.



DATA METHODOLOGY

Timeline

INCA Community Services, Inc. conducts a needs assessment every 3 years. Our agency collects surveys the last quarter of the year the needs assessment is due. Surveys were collected October 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018 with community forums conducted during this time as well.

Data Sources

Along with the Community Needs Survey [See appendix] INCA also utilized customer satisfaction data, Census data, and community forums to complete the report. The surveys were handed out in several ways ranging from in-person paper surveys, email, community meetings, and INCA's website/social media. Community forums were held in Johnston and Atoka Counties with local community groups to provide qualitative data on key issues.

Sample Size

The surveys were collected from five sectors: faith-based, low-income, community based, and educational in each service county. The survey sample size of each sector was determined using the Survey Monkey Sample Size Calculator Tool (<u>www.surveymonkey.com/mp/sample-size-calculator/</u>). The resulting calculations were used to set goal number of responses from each sector for each county: faith-based (20 per county), low-income (67 per county), community based (10 per county), and educational (2 per county). In addition to these sectors, agency volunteers, governmental, agency board members, private organizations, and general public were also surveyed.

Sectors

Representatives from the following sectors were surveyed: Faith-based, low-income agency customers, community based organizations, educational institutions, agency volunteers, governmental entities, agency board members, private organizations, and general public.

Surveys Received

INCA collected seven hundred and fifty-one (751) surveys. The surveys were collected from one hundred ten (110) representatives of a faith-based organizations, three hundred seventy four (374) low income customers, sixty six (66) representatives of a community based organizations, twenty three (23) representatives of an educational institutions, twenty four (24) representatives of a government entities, six (6) representatives of private organizations, one hundred nine (109) general public members, fourteen (14) agency board members, and ten (10) agency volunteers.



KEY FINDINGS

To understand poverty in INCA's community we have to start with the county's rural nature. According to The <u>United States</u> <u>Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service</u> rural areas tend to be poorer than urban areas, with 14.2 percent of the rural population being poor compared to only 11.6 percent of the urban population. With our community experiencing even higher averages of over 17%. Nationally, the rural poverty rate has exceeded the urban rate every year since poverty was first officially measured in the 1960s. Furthermore, poverty rates tend to be highest in counties like the four in INCA's service area, that are not adjacent to urban counties.

Analyzing the poverty and demographic data along with the survey responses leadership staff and planning committee members were able to make some conclusions about the causes and condition of poverty in INCA's community.

Common contributors to poverty in rural areas such as population density, limited tax base that restricts investment in social capital such as education and health care, and economic structures that include limited opportunities, and low wage occupations are all present within this four county community, but additional, more specific causes and conditions were also identified:

- Lack of Resources/Amenities: This seems like a basic factor, but is causing population decline, which then in turn leads to decreased economic vitality in the region's natural and cultural amenities. This includes resources to nutrition, health, recreation, education, employment, and linkages such as technological infrastructure like high speed internet, and entertainment. These amenities attract not only tourists, but retirees, entrepreneurs, and others whose arrival generates new jobs.
- Social Norms: Local social norms can benefit families and communities in many ways but can also promote a culture of unsureness or even reinforce poverty. Multigenerational poverty or repeating cycles of poverty for families can be seen in our rural community, due to misconceptions about the causes of poverty, shame or biases that discourage individuals from seeking assistance, or individuals and families not able to see any way out of their conditions. Also less emphasis on educational and career options and attainment can limit community members' ability to seek new or innovative paths that could help them to break out of the cycle of poverty.
- Natural Environment: The area's natural environment its climate, natural resources, and isolation also determine its economic vitality, and in turn, the depth and persistence of poverty. Due to the rural nature of our community we lack geographic advantage affecting several factors. Geographic isolation creates distance from product and labor markets, which can be seen by the amount of commuter travel needed by residents for employment, purposes. Our rural community does not have the largest variety when it comes to industry and employers due to the lack of amenities and natural resources affecting the overall economic environment.

These factors, along with their more traditional counterparts, must be taken into account when accessing how to address the prioritized needs. Results from the survey responses along with key findings of demographics, community, education, employment, health, housing linkages, nutrition, and poverty statistics were used to identify a congruent community assessment and strategies INCA would utilize to address the local causes and conditions.

Demographic Key Findings

Total population of service area is 54,745 and the population density is highest in Marshall and Murray Counties. The highest age groups that comprise the population are 5 to 17 and 65+ years old. The over 65 populations are very dominant in all of the counties (over 17%) but especially in Marshall with over 20%. There has been an increase in the population since 2000 with an average growth of 8.5%, but Marshall County has experienced the largest growth, over 20%. Most of the growth can been seen in other races/ethnicities aside from white and black, with a growing Hispanic population especially in Marshall County, who has a higher than state average (9.84%) of over 16%. The service area also has a Native American population, with Atoka County comprised of over 13% more than the other 3 counties. The only race to experience a decrease in population change is black for the service area. The most common household composition for the area is Married family, then Non-Family, and third Single female household.

Community Key Findings

INCA's service area is comprised of both rural and urban communities, with two of the four counties being comprised entirely of rural population: Atoka & Johnston. The remaining 2 counties, Marshall and Murray also have significant rural populations, Marshall with 72%. Murray is the only county to have more urban (54.3%) than rural (45.7%). There is a high percentage of the population 16 to 19 years old not in school or employed, much higher than the state average (10.39%) with Johnston County experiencing more than 18%. Due to the rural nature of this community, scarcity of resources is a recurring theme and access to recreation and fitness facilities is no exceptions, with only Murray County having the only one.

Educational Key Findings

This four county community has lower than state averages in population over 25 with bachelor degree or higher and with no high school diploma, with Marshall County experiencing the lowest in both. Marshall County also has the highest population with limited English household that are linguistically isolated for person 5 years and older. The low educational attainment in both high school diploma and higher education seem correlate to the areas with higher Hispanic populations. The one education measure our community is doing better than the state average is the number of Head Start facilities per 10,000 children under the age of 5. INCA and tribal entities are the only Head Start providers in the area.

Employment Key Findings

The median household income in highest in Murray County (\$57,752) which is higher than the state average (\$48,038) but the remaining 3 counties all fall below that average. On average the household income seems to be lower in the Hispanic and black householders, except in Murray County. In all counties the households with 5 or more individuals experiences a drop in overall income. The unemployment rate for the area seems to track very closely to that of the state, being highest from 2009 to 2013 and now returning to similar percentage as 2006.

Health Key Findings

Our community experiences higher than state average (15.66%) of vulnerable populations with disability (25.28%). The age groups with the highest percentage of disability are 18-64, then 65+, and lastly under 18. For individuals in this area it is more common to be uninsured (18.8%) with a high average and even higher amongst the Hispanic population. Scarcity of resources is also seen in the number of primary care and dentist families', and the community is considered to be a Health Professional Shortage area. Health outcomes are affected by this lack of access with a high rate of poor dental health and poor general health. Our community also experiences a high rate of mortality from drug poisoning which could indicate suicide rates, opioid use, and poor mental health.

Housing Key Findings

Our community's occupied housing units are comprised of a large percentage of renter occupied units, with Murray County having the highest percentage at over 33%. House affordability for both owners and renters contribute to many cost burdened homes in the community with Atoka County experiencing the highest at 23.64%. Substandard housing, high heat index days, as well as households lacking complete kitchens are all higher than average and contribute to poor housing conditions in the area. The area although in need of more rental housing units, has high vacancy rates (26.82%), but most vacant households are considered for other use or for sale and not available to rent.

Linkages Key Findings

Marshall County has a high migrations rate, over 20%. The percent of households without a a motor vehicle (5.62%) is higher as well especially for renter occupied households. This is compounded by many having to commute over 60 minutes to work, especially Atoka County residents (10.54%). Limited resources in both those receiving SNAP benefits and limited access to high speed internet also define the limitations of the community.

Nutrition Key Findings

Children eligible for free/reduced lunch is higher that the state average (62.24%) at over 71% and over 80% for Marshall County. Many neighborhoods in this community are considered food deserts with Atoka County having the most of all the counties (3). This is due to the low food access seen across the entire community, over 30%.

Poverty Key Findings

Over 25% of children 17 and under in this service area are living in poverty. Households experiencing extreme poverty, below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level is also very high for all the counties: Atoka 22%, Johnston 21%, Marshall 17%, and Murray 14%. Poverty is experienced on average in our community higher by females (21%) versus males (15%), and highest among minority races.

Prioritized Needs

INCA leadership staff and ROMA administrator identified that all three prioritized needs had both family/individual level needs and community level needs, that the agency would address through services and community level initiatives. It is important as a Community Action Agency for INCA to focus its efforts on both levels of needs for the prioritized needs if they are committed to addressing the causes and conditions of poverty affecting their community.

As identified the following are the top three (3) prioritized needs to be addressed that the agency's Planning Committee and Board of Directors approved:

1. Public Transportation

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of additional transportation services.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has rural populations with limited or no access to public transportation services.

2. Decent Affordable Houses to Rent

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income do not have financial resources to relocate to another rental unit.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community does not have enough safe, affordable rental housing units available.

3. Health Insurance/Affordable Health Care

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of health insurance.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has limited or no access to affordable health care services.

AGENCY PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Head Start/Early Head Start

INCA Head Start is a pre-school program that is dedicated to providing excellence in education for children 3-5 years of age in Atoka, Johnston, Marshall, and Murray Counties in rural Southern Oklahoma INCA Head Start believes in investing in the future of the families in our rural communities, to empower them with skills and knowledge to meet challenges throughout life.

JAMM Transit

JAMM Transit is a rural public transportation system dedicated to providing excellence in transportation through mobility that promotes self-sufficiency, independence, and improves the quality of life while stimulating economic development with the provision of safe, reliable, affordable and accessible transportation services for the public.

RAVE DDSD

RAVE provides Residential and Vocational Excellence opportunities to individuals with developmental disabilities. Residential services: Habilitation Training Specialist, Daily Living Support, Agency Companion, Respite Services Vocational Services: Workshop Slots, Job Coaching

Housing/ESG

Housing is an essential need for every individual, INCA offers resources to help fill the gap between finding and maintaining safe, decent housing and being able to afford it by offering housing counseling, advocacy, weatherization, energy education, affordable rental housing and homeless assistance.

The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program is a component of the state's efforts to alleviate homelessness in Oklahoma. The ESG program provides the foundation for homeless people to move toward & maintain independence.

Food Bank

INCA's food pantries are located in each of our county offices and distribute emergency food to households who are in need of food assistance. Our food pantries help to increase access to food for the hungry, and decrease the overall food insecurity rate of our community. Supported by public, grants, and private donations.

Clothing Bank

INCA's clothing banks help provide clothing to individuals unable to purchase needed garments due to financial strain. They offer clothing in good condition at no cost to anyone who has a need. Financial strain can be temporary and caused by events such as unemployment, increase in bills, medical, back to school expenses or to meet need in times of crisis due to loss by fire or other emergency situation.

Medical Lending Closet

INCA has an assortment of medical equipment, including wheelchairs, hospital beds, shower chairs, lift chairs, walkers, crutches, canes, etc. Other items in the lending closet are an assortment blood pressure cuffs, adult briefs, bedding, leg and arm braces, and many other items. The large assortment is housed in the Atoka Office.

RSVP - Retired and Senior Volunteer Program

RSVP is a volunteer program for people 55 and over. RSVP serves as a bridge between organizations in need of volunteers and individuals seeking to help and stay active. RSVP partners with many local organizations to help improve our communities in Atoka, Carter, Coal, Garvin, Johnston, Love, Marshall, Murray, and Pontotoc Counties. "RSVP is an invitation to serve."



RX for Oklahoma

RX for Oklahoma is a prescription assistance program designed to help Oklahoma residents, regardless of age, who are uninsured or underinsured.

Senior Health Assistance

Our Medicare Assistance Program is comprised of two divisions: SHIP (Senior Health Insurance Counseling Program) and SMP (Seniors Medicare/Medicaid Fraud, Abuse and Waste Reduction Program)

The SHIP Program is a free health benefits counseling service for Medicare beneficiaries and their families or caregivers. SHIP's mission is to educate, advocate, counsel, and empower people to make informed healthcare benefit decisions. SHIP is an independent program funded by Federal agencies and is not affiliated with the insurance industry.

The SMP Program help senior Oklahomans learn how to protect themselves from health care fraud and monitor what Medicare/Medicaid has paid on a beneficiary's behalf. SMP provides materials outlining how to read a Medicare Summary Notice and how to detect and report discrepancies.

Navigator

Navigators provide accurate and impartial assistance to consumers shopping for coverage in the Health Insurance Marketplace, including consumers who are not familiar with health insurance, have limited English proficiency, or are living with a disability.

VITA

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) offers free tax help to people with limited incomes. Volunteers sponsored by INCA Community Services, Inc. receive training to prepare basic tax returns.

Weatherization

Weatherization Assistance provides a wide variety of cost-saving energy efficiency measures. INCA's Weatherization specific services include, attic insulation, caulking, weather stripping, air sealing, head and cooling adjustments, and replacement of doors and windows, all services are designed to stop air infiltration throughout the home.

Holiday Projects

INCA takes an active role in helping those in need during the holiday season. They participate in Toys for Tots toy collection, manage the Atoka County Little Angel Tree, and host many local food drives to give everyone the chance to enjoy the holiday season.

Current Services and Programs Continued

Current services/programs that survey recipients indicated they would like continued for each count are as follows:

- Atoka: Emergency Services (Food, Clothing, Shelter, Utilities), Public Transportation, Homeless Assistance)
- Johnston: Emergency Services (Food, Clothing, Shelter, Utilities), Homeless Assistance, Developmental Disabilities Support)
- Marshall: Public Transportation, Head Start/Early Head Start, Emergency Services (Food, Clothing, Shelter, Utilities)
- Murray: Public Transportation, Emergency Services (Food, Clothing, Shelter, Utilities), Head Start/Early Head Start)













ASSESSMENT PROFILE

Identified Needs

As included in the Key Findings section the top three (3) prioritized need are identified by level of need., In addition to this leadership staff and planning committee members identified the level of need for the top five (5) identified needs, and overall top ten (10) ranking needs.

1. Decent Affordable Houses to Rent

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income do not have financial resources to relocate to another rental unit.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community does not have enough safe, affordable rental housing units available.

2. Public Transportation

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of additional transportation services.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has rural populations with limited or no access to public transportation services.

3. Higher Paying Jobs or Jobs with Benefits

a. Community Level Need: Our community has rural populations with limited access to living wage jobs and/or jobs with benefits.

4. Health Insurance/Affordable Health Care

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of health insurance.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has limited or no access to affordable health care services.

5. Dental Insurance/Affordable Dental

a. Community Level Need: Our community has limited or no access to affordable dental care services.

6. Safe Neighborhoods, Sidewalks, Parks

a. Community Level Need: Our community has limited infrastructure resources available to provide safe recreational and neighborhood activities.

7. Availability/Access to Food (Grocery Store)

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of healthy and affordable food to maintain health.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has limited access to nutritional resources with several food deserts present.

8. Utility Assistance

a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need utility assistance to maintain safe housing.

9. RX (Prescription Assistance)

a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of prescription assistance to obtain required medications to improve and maintain health.

10. GED Classes

a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of high school equivalency diploma education to attain employment.

Ranking was assigned to each need by careful analysis of Community Needs Assessment Survey results, key findings from census data, and community forum feedback. The survey results were analyzed by the top ten highest ranking need for each of the 5 sectors to understand the causes and conditions of poverty as affected by gender, race, ethnicity, income level, family type, education level, veteran/disability status, and sector. [See Appendix] After weight was assigned to the identified need from the survey results, census statistical data was correlated for the following demographic profiles: Nutrition, Employment, Health, Linkages, Education, Housing, and Community.

Prioritized Needs

The Board of Director's planning committee went over the results of the analyzed data that was collected from the needs survey. The committee looked at all the community resources available and made a recommendation to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors analyzed the data and voted to prioritize the top three needs to be addressed:

1. Public Transportation

- **a.** Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of additional transportation services.
- **b.** Community Level Need: Our community has rural populations with limited or no access to public transportation services.

2. Decent Affordable Houses to Rent

- **a.** Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income do not have financial resources to relocate to another rental unit.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community does not have enough safe, affordable rental housing units available.

3. Health Insurance/Affordable Health Care

- a. Family Level Need: Individuals and families with low income are in need of health insurance.
- b. Community Level Need: Our community has limited or no access to affordable health care services.

To overcome the limitations caused by the causes and conditions outlined in the Key Findings programs and services will be utilized to address the family level needs and will be tracked to assess whether they are effective at producing outcomes that fulfill community needs or if changes need to be made. Community level initiatives will be developed to address the community level needs.

Community Resources

The agency looked at the current list of community partners and the surveys received by the five (5) sectors. The agency looked at the identified needs to determine which needs the agency can address and which needs were better addressed through our partnerships. Staff attended community meetings (faith-based, community, civic, private, public) in each of the four counties and collected surveys. Community forums were held in Atoka and Johnston County to gain additional qualitative data. Atoka Chamber of Commerce, Tishomingo Lion's Club, and Johnston County Women's Biz participated in highly engaging community forums that provided additional insight on the causes and conditions of poverty in their community. A complete list of agency partnerships is included in the Appendix.











NEEDS AS IDENTIFIED BY DEMOGRAPHIC CATEGORIES






Population, Density (Persons per Sq Mile) by Tract, ACS 2012-16










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Median Age by Tract, ACS 2012-16








Population Age 18-64, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16




Population Age 65+, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16



Family Households, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16








Urban Population, Percent by Tract, US Census 2010










Recreation and Fitness Facilities, Rate (Per 100,000 Pop.) by ZCTA, CBP 2016


















Percent Population Age 25+ with No High School Diploma







Median Household Income by Tract, ACS 2012-16








Unemployment, Rate by County, BLS 2018 - August






Population with Any Disability by Gender

Disabled Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16






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Uninsured Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16














Access to Primary Care Physicians, Rate per 100,000 Pop. by County, AHRF 2014






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Drug Overdose Mortality, Age Adj. Rate (Per 100,000 Pop.) by County, NVSS 2012-16






Adults Age 18+ Without Dental Exam in Past 12 Months, Percent by County, BRFSS 2006-10




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Renter-Occupied Housing Units, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16









High Heat Index Days, Percentage of Observations Over 103°F by County, NLDAS 2014






Cost Burdened Households (Housing Costs Exceed 30% of Household Income), Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16






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Substandard Housing Units, Percent of Total by Tract, ACS 2012-16








Vacant Housing Units, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16




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Net Migration, Rate per 100 Population by County, Uni. of Wisconsin 2000 to 2010
















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Recreation and Fitness Facilities, Rate (Per 100,000 Pop.) by ZCTA, CBP 2016




Students Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch, NCES CCD 2015-16




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Net Migration, Rate per 100 Population by County, Uni. of Wisconsin 2000 to 2010










Unemployment, Rate by County, BLS 2018 - August








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Population Below the Poverty Level, Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16






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Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2012-16









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What are the barriers to economic stability for individuals and families in Johnston County?

The barriers to economic stability were addressed within the meeting showing an increased need for living wage employment opportunities, job/life skills, cost of living, drug use, and assistant dependent. The attendees felt that Johnston County is limited and see that many people have to travel outside the county for employment.. The attendees also cited that the younger generation does not have the work ethics or job skills that are needed, and many are dependent on government assistance.

2 What resources are needed in Johnston County that aren't currently available?

The resources needed in the community were cited as being entertainment, more employment options, more employable individuals, affordable childcare, and housing. The expressed a need to market the county better to keep individuals in the county and attract more to the area.

3 What are the biggest community concerns/issues in Johnston County currently?

The concerns cited negative perception, drug use on the rise, domestic violence, shelters for women, community activities and involvement, and need ideas needed. There a lot of drug activity within the area that needs to be a primary focus on many of our leaders in the area to help people get off and stay off of drugs. More opportunities and resources in general are needed to round out the quality or life for residents.

4 Is the homelessness affecting Johnston County?

People do not realize how bad the problem really is, because they don't see the homeless population as much. There are also a lot or citizens that are in bad living conditions because of the "slum lords" renting overpriced unsafe homes. Community does not see the overall effect of the homeless issue like it does in bigger cities.

5 Do you think Johnston County needs a homeless shelter?

Yes. There needs to be a resource center that is more than just providing temporary shelter, needs to focus on teaching skills and them working towards their own self sufficiency. Need services that help break the cycle of poverty and homelessness.

1 What are the barriers to economic stability for individuals and families in Atoka County?

The barriers to economic stability were addressed within the meeting showing an increased need for education, affordable housing, and homeless assistance. The attendees felt that Atoka County is growing and we will see some many needed businesses in the area which will assist in more people obtaining employment as well as continue to help the community grow. The attendees also cited that the younger generation does not have the work ethics that are needed because they have a difficult time coming to work on time and being there daily giving employers a reason to not want to hire them. We need some work ethics training to help address this area and encourage our younger generation to be more involved in their employment and take ownership of their jobs so they are working to create a better working environment.

2 What resources are needed in Atoka County that aren't currently available?

The resources needed in the community were cited as being housing, good clean rental property, reintegration from prisons and homeless shelters. The area has a high need for homeless assistance. We discussed the programs INCA already has and the impact we have made on the community in this area. We also talked about assistance for those who are coming out of the prison systems. The audience felt we needed more assistance for those coming out such as job programs and help getting into homes so they do not commit the same crimes again.

3 What are the biggest community concerns/issues in Atoka County currently?

The biggest concern for the community was a women's/homeless shelter and drugs in the area. We have a lot of drug activity within the area that needs to be a primary focus on many of our leaders in the area to help people get off and stay off of drugs. A women's shelter has been a need for a long time as people are needing emergency placement especially in regards to domestic abuse. Food resources were another concern, we lightly touched on how vital the Food Warehouse is for the people in the community.

4 Is the homelessness affecting Atoka County?

Yes. Homelessness affects the county. Discussion centered around people standing at the red light at walmart and if they were truly in need. The consensus was that some may and some may not be in need but the fact is that we do have a homeless issue within the area. One member stated she knew of 5 people that were hiding within the county and were living on the streets. This brought us back to a shelter in order to house those who need it the most.

5 Do you think Atoka County needs a homeless shelter?

Yes the group felt we needed a homeless shelter to help impact those in need. One member suggested integrating education assistance into the shelter. Another member stated we should do work programs and help get them re-established within the area in an effort to make them successful. Another member didn't believe we needed a homeless shelter. We discussed about people coming out of prison and where a lot of them go afterwards since there is no shelter and I explained what INCA does especially for people who want to go to another area so we purchase bus tickets and provide transportation.
